

Please accept the below questions for RFQ#3 FY19 Body Worn Camera.

1. How many patrol shifts does the Department have per day?

Pasco Sheriff's Office has three (3) districts within the county. Each district has three (3) Patrol shifts per day.

2. How long is each patrol shift?

Each shift is 12 hours long. 0500-1700, 1100-2300 & 1700-0500

3. On average, how many officers are out on a shift at a time?

16-18 patrol members per district, per shift. Approximately 50 patrol members at a time.

4. On average, how much video does the Department expect to record per shift? An estimate will provide a baseline for vendors to use to calculate storage costs so that the Department can have a fair cost comparison.

Pasco Sheriff's Office logs approximately 1,800 video files per day.

5. How many locations will be used to upload video?

Each patrol member has an issued docking station to use at home. The three district offices each have a six (6) bay docking station for use while in the office.

6. How many Officers will be uploading video at a shift change at each location?

7. What kind of connectivity exists between locations? How much connectivity is available for video transfer?

From the detention center we have a 1Gbit/1Gbit internet connection

District 1 traverses the detention center and uses the 1Gbit/1Gbit internet connection

District 2 traverses the detention center and uses the 1Gbit/1Gbit internet connection

District 3 has a 75/75Mbps FIOS connection out to the internet.

I can't determine how much bandwidth is available for video uploading. We don't currently utilize quality of service so all traffic gets the same priority. We definitely don't want there to be hundreds of gigabytes of information that may saturate our circuits.

8. If each site has internet connectivity what is the bandwidth speed (up and down)?

9. What are the Department's video retention policies? How long is non-evidentiary / evidentiary video kept in active storage? How long is video kept archive storage?

Non-evidentiary video files are kept for four (4) years.

Evidentiary cases, Agency vehicle crashes, Deputy Injury are kept indefinitely

10. Will cameras be assigned or pooled?

The cameras will be assigned to an individual member

11. Will cameras be returned to the Department after each shift or will they be taken home by the user?

Cameras will be taken home by the user. See question #5

12. Will you want remote access by supervisors to stored video?

Yes, for supervisor review or any possible complaints from citizens

13. Will a redaction station be required at each site or will redaction for FOIA requests be done from a central location?

All redaction will be done at a central location by the Body Camera Administrator.
